Putting Business to Work!

Ford introduced the TT in 1917 as a heavy duty version of the Model T chassis. The chassis could easily be outfitted with after-market bodies. It continued in production through 1927 when it was replaced by the AA.

The success of the Model TT Truck was its ability to produce high torque using a standard 20-horsepower Model T engine. The truck produced that higher torque by utilization of a large "worm gear" embedded into the rear end. The worm gear was driven by the drive shaft. While the worm gear definitely produced higher torque, the vehicle lost speed. Model TT trucks can easily carry one ton loads, but often cannot exceed 17 miles per hour.
